

The chart below shows estimated world literacy rates by region and by gender for the year 2000.

The graph displays the percentage of world illiteracy from six areas between men and women.

In general, it can be clearly seen the rate of male was always higher than female in 2000. The lowest rates were in Developed Countries nearly 1%, by the contrast in the South Asia, where have very high number of men and women of illiteracy, were approximately 32% for female and 55% for male. By the other hand, another place from Asia namely East Asia/Oceania had only 9% by women and over double of men was 20%. Following the line chart, the highest number of women was South Asia

approximately 33%, in Sub-Saharan Africa and Arab States were very high too about 30% and 29%. In contrast, the rates of illiteracy was very low in Latin America/Caribbean 10% of women, but the number of male and female were the same, 11% of men. Besides that, the rates of female in East Asia/Oceania was low than Latin America/Caribbean approximately 8%, even though the number of male in East Asia had double of Latin, was 20%.
